



The Organizing Committee of the Fourth Nagoya International Blood and Marrow Transplantation Symposium is pleased to welcome all of you.

Stem cell transplantation has now been widely used as cure-oriented therapy for acute leukemia, chronic myelogenous leukemia (CML) and severe aplastic anemia. Particularly, for those patients who have resistant disease or are at high risk to relapse, stem cell transplantation is the treatment of choice. Approximately 1,000 stem cell transplantation are currently being performed annually in Japan with promising results. There are, however, still serious morbidity and mortality associated with this treatment, including GVHD, graft rejection and viral infections. In order to decrease these complications and to further increase the safety, efficacy and availability of allogenic stem cell transplantation, we need to promote clinical research to create EBM in this field.

This symposium has been organized jointly by Nagoya BMT group and Kyowa Hakko Kogyo Co., Ltd since 1996. The aim of the meeting is to provide an international forum for exchanging the up-to-date information and experience. The program of this year's symposium highlights a new aspect of allogenic stem cell transplantation; an immunotherapy. We are happy that many expert physicians and investigators from abroad and Japan will lead the program. I hope that valuable information of clinical relevance will be generated by all speakers and participants during the meeting.
